Are you looking for a position that will provide flexibility? Consider substituting in a support position at Bethlehem Area School District. Substitute instructional assistants work on an on-call schedule based upon the needs of the district and with special and regular education teachers to support students with special needs including physical, learning, and behavioral difficulties.

Responsibilities include but are not limited to:

- assisting in students' educational and social development under the direction and guidance of the special education teacher
- providing support for individual students inside and outside the classroom to enable them to fully participate in activities
- escorting, rephrasing or repeating teacher directions, and helping students with tasks
- supporting students with academic and organizational concerns
- assisting with the implementation of Individual Education Plans for the students and monitoring their progress
- assisting classroom teacher with maintaining student records

Substitute instructional assistants must have a willingness to learn how to collect various types of academic data and complete observations and must be able to interact well with students, school staff, and parents. In some cases, students may need help with personal hygiene such as bathroom processes.
